Background

• I chose a Global Health month in Guatemala with the goal of seeing medicine in a developing country, participating in a culture different than my own, and furthering my Spanish for future medical practice.

Objective

- Learn from local nurses, doctors, and traditional healers
- Improve communication in Spanish
- Experience local customs and culture
- Connect with patients of all ages in a novel setting

Preparation

- Engaged in Global Health lectures and simulations in preparation for culture shock and cultural humility.
- Reviewed resources from host physician about common ailments and the health care system in Guatemala
- Researched the history of devastating civil war and current political climate in view of an imminent election















Experience

- Worked alongside a Guatemalan General
 Practice physician to treat indigenous Mayan
 patients of all ages.
- Treated patients from birth to end-of-life with a broad range of conditions.
- Met with a local midwife, teachers, doctors, and nurses to learn about traditional and locally-practiced modern medicine.
- Attended Spanish class and lived with host family.

Reflection

- Understanding the political, cultural, and ideological background of patients is key in successfully treating medical problems.
- Mosquito borne illness and childhood malnutrition are common. Mortality rate before age 5 is high: 28 in 1,000 births.

Future Directions

- Acknowledging different cultural and personal backgrounds for effective communication in my own practice moving forward
- Continue to learn and practice Spanish
