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Improving frequency of peer review of abnormal genital exam findings in patients undergoing sexual abuse evaluation

Background

- Appropriate interpretation of sexual abuse exam findings is crucial for accurate diagnosis and provision of medical information to multidisciplinary teams.
- Mimics exist which may be misinterpreted as findings of trauma (1).
- Peer review of exam findings is an emerging standard (2) and 2023 accreditation standards for Child Advocacy Centers require peer review of 100% of findings deemed "diagnostic" of trauma (3).
- Specific aim: To increase completion of peer review of abnormal acute and non-acute genital exam findings from baseline of 27% to 75% by March 15, 2023.

Methods

- Cases eligible for review included findings of trauma, findings without expert consensus, visible signs of sexually transmitted infections, and medical mimics.
- Performed pre-intervention chart review to determine baseline.
- Provided education and developed QR code to report cases for review.
- QI methodology: used QI tools, created run chart.
- Outcome measure: Completion of peer review.
- Process measure: Number of cases reported.
- Balancing measure: Physician rating of balance of cases at case review.
